Money and grant opportunity

Dear Chapter Leaders,

I'm happy to let you know that Audubon Collaborative Funding Grants are available again this year, and the application period opens today, September 30.

Collaborative Funding Grants are small grants available to certified Audubon chapters to support new or continuing conservation and outreach projects. The amount of funding available varies by state, and most grants awarded are in the \$300-\$1,000 range.

This application form is available here, and applications are due to collabfunding@audubon.org by November 30, 2016.

The Collaborative Funding Grant process is competitive, and funds may not be available to cover all projects. Strong applications will include clear links to Audubon's strategic initiatives, specific goals and outcomes, and matching funds. Collaborative Funding Grants are also designed to foster partnerships and outreach, so applications naming more than one partner are encouraged.

Previous successful collaborative funding projects by Audubon chapters have included native plants projects, climate change workshops, advocacy campaigns, habitat restoration work, and outreach efforts in a wide variety of communities.

This year's application form has been simplified based on your feedback. We hope this will make it easier for you to write a concise and compelling application. And as always, please ensure that your chapter completed last year's annual report and that if your chapter received a previous Collaborative Funding Grant, that report was completed.

Applications must be submitted to collabfunding@audubon.org on or before November 30, 2016.

Grant award notifications will be made in December 2016. Please let us know if you have any questions. Thank you for all you do,


